Hello Upper Elementary,

Happy summer! I am excited to send out our summer reading list. Please choose at least two books that you'd like to read, one from this list and one from your own choosing. You may request them from your local library, order them online, or buy them at your local bookstore.

When choosing your books, I encourage you to read for pleasure, learning, and broadening your perspectives on the world and humanity. Choose two different genres of books. There is so much out there! Historical fiction, mysteries, fantasy, science fiction, biographies, graphic novels... I encourage you to choose at least one book that you wouldn't typically read. Don't feel pressured to stick to your grade level below- if there is a book that interests you, go for it!

Choose one book to write a short report about. If you're a rising 4th year, your report should be around a page long and handwritten. If you are a rising 5th or 6th year, your report should be around two pages long and handwritten. Some of the things you might write about in your report are the story elements (i.e. characters, setting, plot), some of the major events, whether you liked or disliked them, your favorite or least favorite characters, how the book made you feel, or anything else about the book you'd like to share. I've included a book report organizer to help organize your thoughts before writing your actual report. If you'd like to add some sort of illustration or artistic expression in addition to the written work, please do! Be ready to turn in your report the first week of school and to read it aloud to the class. I can't wait to see what books you choose- I always get great feedback from my students!

Also this year, a math packet is being sent home for skill review. It will cover many skills learned over the past year as well as fact practice. I encourage you to do a little bit at a time and not wait to do it all at once (no procrastinators!); that would defeat the purpose of review! Plan to bring in your finished packet to school with your book reports once we return to school.
